Eligibility

1.NOMENCLATURE

1.1 Faculty: Refers to a group of programmes concerned with a major division of knowledge Eg. Faculty of Computer Science consists of disciplines like Departments of Computer Science, Information Technology, Computer Technology, Computer Applications, Data Analytics, Cognitive Systems, Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning and Cyber Security

1.2 Programme: Refers to the Bachelor of Science / Commerce / Arts stream that a student has chosen for study.

1.3 Batch: Refers to the starting and completion year of a programme of study. Eg. Batch of 2023-26 refers to students belonging to a 3 year Degree programme admitted in 2023 and completing in 2026.

1.4 Course: Refers to component of a programme. A course may be designed to involve lectures / tutorials / laboratory work / seminar / project work/ practical training / report writing / Viva- voce, etc., or a combination of these, to meet effectively the teaching learning needs.

- a) **Core Course:** A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement
- b) **Inter Disciplinary Course (IDC):** A course chosen generally from a related discipline/subject with an intention to seek exposure in the discipline relating to the core domain of the student
- c) **Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course:** Elective courses offered under main discipline/ subject of study.
- d) **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):** Value-based and/or skill-based courses which are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc.
- e) **Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC):** Mandatory courses that lead to Knowledge enhancement. Environmental Science, Human Rights and Women's Rights, Basic Tamil/ Advanced Tamil, Innovation and IPR, Innovation, IPR and Entrepreneurship.
- f) **Ability Enhancement Elective Course (AEEC)/Generic Elective (GE)** An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is Generic Elective.



1.5 Project Work:

Course involving application of knowledge in problem solving / analyzing / exploring a real life situation / difficult problem. The Project work will be given in lieu of a Core paper.

Internship/Industrial Training

Students must undertake industrial / institutional training for a minimum of 15 days during the IV semester summer vacation. The students will submit the report for evaluation during V semester.

1.6 Extra Credits:

Extra credits shall be awarded for achievements in identified curricular/co-curricular/Extracurricular activities executed outside the regular class hours. Extra credits are not mandatory for completing the programme.

2. STRUCTURE OF PROGRAMME

2.1 PART- I: LANGUAGE- I

Tamil or any one of the languages namely Malayalam, Hindi and French will be offered under Part – I in the first four semesters.

2.2 PART- II: LANGUAGE- II

English will be offered during the first four semesters.

2.3 PART- III:

- Core Course
- Inter Departmental Course (IDC)
- Discipline Specific Elective (DSE)
- Skill Enhancement Course (SEC)
- Industrial Training (IT)

2.4 PART- IV:

2.4.1 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC):

The Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses such as i) Environmental Studies, ii) Human Rights and Womens' Rights, iii) Innovation and IPR/ Innovation, IPR and Entrepreneurship are offered during I,II and VI Semester.

Basic Tamil

a) Those who have not studied Tamil up to XII Std and taken a non-Tamil language under Part-I shall take one Basic Tamil course in the second semester.



(OR)

Advanced Tamil

b) Those who have studied Tamil up to XII Std and taken a non-Tamil language under Part-I shall take one Advanced Tamil course in the second semester.

Note: Students who come under the above a+b categories are exempted from Human Rights and Women's Rights in the second semester.

Ability Enhancement Elective Course (AEEC)/Generic Elective (GE) An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is Generic Elective offered in V semester. (Theory/Practical/Non-Lab Practical)

2.5 PART- V: EXTENSION ACTIVITIES

The following extracurricular activities like NSS/YRC/NCC/RRC/Yoga/Sports/Clubs are offered under extension activities during semester I & II. Students will be evaluated based on their active participation in any one of the above activities. 75% Attendance is compulsory for extension activity.

3. CREDIT ALLOTTMENT

The following is the credit allotment:

- Lecture Hours (Theory) : 1 credit per lecture hour per week
- Laboratory Hours : 1 credit for 2 Practical hours per week
- Project Work : 1 credit for 2 hours of project work per week

4. DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME

The B.A. /B.Com./B. Sc. Programme must be completed within 3 years (6 semesters) and a maximum of 6 years (12 semesters) from the date of acceptance to the programme. If not, the candidate must enroll in the course determined to be an equivalent by BoS in the most recent curriculum recommended for the Programme.

5.REQUIREMENTS FOR COMPLETION OF A SEMESTER

Every student shall ordinarily be allowed to keep terms for the given semester in a program of his/ her enrolment, only if he/ she fulfills at least seventy five percent (75%) of the attendance taken as an average of the total number of lectures, practicals, tutorials, etc. wherein short and/or long excursions/field visits/study tours organised by the college and supervised by the faculty as envisaged in the syllabus shall be credited to his/her attendance. Every student shall have a minimum of 75% as an overall attendance.

6. EXAMINATIONS



The end semester examinations shall normally be conducted after completing 90 working days for each semester. The maximum marks for each theory and practical course shall be 100 with the following breakup:

Unit I Introduction of pattern making 10 h

Pattern making- definition, types, drafting, draping and flat pattern making- merits and demerits. Body measurement – importance, preparing for measuring and tools for taking measurements - manual. Body measurements for men, women and children. Tools for clothing construction- measuring tools, marking tools, cutting tools, sewing tools and pressing tools.

Unit II Pattern making and grading techniques 10 h

Drafting -principles of pattern drafting, pattern details, steps in drafting basic bodice front, back, sleeve and collar for men, women and children. Types of paper patterns -patterns for personal measurements and commercial patterns. Draping- techniques to drape basic front bodice, basic back bodice and skirt using dress form. Grading- definition, principles of grading- scientific grading techniques- front, back, sleeve and collar. An introduction to computerized grading.

Unit III Pattern principles and pattern layout 10 h

Pattern layout - definition, rules to remember in pattern layout, types- open layout, lengthwise centre fold, off-centre length wise fold, crosswise centre fold, off centre crosswise fold, double fold and combination fold. Special layouts for asymmetric designs, fabrics with bold designs, stripped and checked designs, fabric with one way design. Dove tailing and piecing. Transferring pattern markings – methods- tracing wheel and carbon paper, tailor chalk, common pins and tailors tacks.

Unit IV Fabric cutting and stitching methods 10 h

Preparation of fabric for cutting –importance of grain in cutting and construction, steps in preparing the fabric for cutting. Fabric cutting- definition and methods- manual cutting, manually operated power knife cutting, computerized cutting. Stitching- stay stitching and ease stitching. Fitting - standards of good fit, different types of fit - classic fit, slim fit, super slim fit.

Unit V Pattern alteration and dart manipulation 08 h

Pattern alteration - importance of altering patterns, general principles for pattern alteration. Basic pattern alterations -lengthening, shortening, alteration for broad



shoulders, narrow shoulders, square shoulders, sloping shoulders, round shoulders, hollow back, hollow chest and large bust patterns. Dart manipulation-creating styles through shifting bodice dart to new position, adding fullness at the top and bottom edges of the bodice, converting darts to seams, incorporating darts into a seam forming the yoke, converting darts to a partial yoke design.

Syllabus

Unit I Sewing machineries 8 h

Sewing machineries - types of sewing machines- hand, pedal or treadle, electric and computerized sewing machine. Classification of advanced sewing machines - over lock machine, flat lock machine, bar tacking machine, buttonhole making machine, button fixing machine. Feeding mechanisms - drop feed, differential feed, needle feed, compound feed, unison feed, puller feed.

Unit II Sewing machine parts and their functions 10 h

Parts of a single needle sewing machine -spool pin, thread guides, tension disc, take-up lever, needle bar, bobbin case, presser foot, presser foot lifter, stitch regulator, bobbin winder, flywheel, clutch or thumb screw, slide plate, needle plate or throat plate, feed dog, face plate, spoon pin for bobbin winding. Operating the sewing machine- winding the bobbin, selection of thread and needle, stitching along lines, under threading, top threading, drawing the bobbin thread, sewing on fabric, fastening the thread ends. Adjustments - testing and adjusting tension, adjusting the stitch length, adjusting the pressure of the presser foot, change in the needle.

Unit III Special attachments and maintenance of sewing machines 10 h

Special attachments - hemmer foot, ruffler, binder, tucker, cloth guide, cording foot or zipper foot, gathering foot, feed cover plate. Care and maintenance of sewing machines - cleaning, oiling. Minor troubles and their causes -tangled thread at the beginning, skipped stitches, upper and lower thread breaking, fabric puckering, needle breaking, staggered stitches, uneven stitch length, material not feeding correctly, machine runs heavily.

Unit IV Cutting technology 10 h

Spreading- types, qualities, equipments, tools and its methods. Marking - methods - manual and computerized, types of markers, efficiency of a marker plan, requirements of marker planning. Cutting technology- definition, objectives, and requirements of fabric cutting, advantages and disadvantages. Industrial cutting machines and its categories - manual, semi-automatic - straight knife cutting machine, band knife cutting machine, rotary cutting machine, die cutters and notches, fully automatic - computerized cutting machine, rib cutting machine, laser cutting machine.



Unit V Sewing Essentials and Pressing

10 h

Sewing threads - types, properties of a sewing thread. Needle, types and sizes of needle and its usage. Stitches- definition, standards of stitches, stitch classification, application of various stitches in apparels, defects and remedies of stitches used in apparel industry. Pressing equipments - purpose, types of pressing equipments and methods of pressing- iron, steam press, steam air finisher, special types - pleating and permanent press.
